

She is a historian of Islamic art and a museums scholar who is committed to creating fertile grounds of empathy through informal learning platforms to inspire positive behavior change, caring mindsets, and compassionate worldviews that value all of humanity and the planet. She is the editor of two visionary books on empathy-building: Fostering Empathy Through Museums (Rowman and Littlefield, 2016), and Designing for Empathy: Perspectives on the Museum Experience (American Alliance of Museums & Rowman and Littlefield, 2019). In 2017, Dr. Gökçiğdem started the Designing for Empathy™ programs, which offer customized experiential empathy-building workshops and lectures, as well as an annual Designing for Empathy Summit. She curated and led the world's first Empathy Summit with His Holiness the Dalai Lama in 2018, in Dharamsala, India, where her Empathy-Building Through Museums Initiative was invited to bring 30 multidisciplinary experts to learn from the Dalai Lama. She is an advisor to several pioneering empathy initiatives by major U.S. museums, including Minneapolis Institute of Art's Center for Empathy and Visual Arts, as well as the Advancing Empathy for Wildlife collaborative by the Seattle Aquarium, the Woodland Park Zoo, and Point Defiance Zoo and Aquarium. In late 2020, Dr. Gökçiğdem founded a non-profit (status pending) organization, ONE: Organization of Networks for Empathy™, which will help innovate and advance ideas, tools, standards, and best practices of empathy-building beyond museums, establishing empathy as a shared value across disciplines and sectors. He has taught at NYU/ Tisch and the Yale Drama School. In addition to a B.A. from Oberlin College, Himberg holds a degree as a Doctor of Chinese Medicine, and previously was a practicing acupuncturist and herbalist.
